




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ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

The Delta Regional Authority (DRA) presents its 2023 Annual Report, which serves as the agency's annual report to the U.S. Congress. BACKGROUND

DRA is an independent federal agency of the U.S. government. DRA was established in 2000 as a formal framework for joint federal-state collaboration to promote and encourage the economic development of the lower Mississippi River and Alabama Black Belt regions. To fulfill this purpose, DRA invests in projects supporting transportation infrastructure, basic public infrastructure, workforce training and business development. DRA works to create jobs, build communities and improve the lives of those that reside in the region. DRA's region encompasses 252 counties and parishes in parts of Alabama, Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri and Tennessee.

Congress mandated (7 U.S.C. §2009aa) that DRA shall provide funding for the following four categories:

- Basic public infrastructure in distressed counties and isolated areas of distress;
- Transportation infrastructure for the purpose of facilitating economic development in the region;
- Business development, with emphasis on entrepreneurship; and
- Job training or employment-related education, with emphasis on the use of existing public educational institutions located in the region.

Congressional stipulations include:

- The authority will allocate at least 75% of its funds for use in distressed counties; and
- The authority shall allocate at least 50% of any funds for transportation and basic public infrastructure projects.



FISCAL YEAR 2023 COUNTIES & PARISHES

DRA calculates distress criteria on an annual basis. To be deemed distressed, counties and parishes must meet the following criteria:

1. An unemployment rate of one percent higher than the national average for the most recent 24-month period.

2. Have a per capita income of 80 percent or less of the most recent national per capita income level. DRA's enabling legislation requires the authority to update its distressed and non-distressed counties as well as isolated areas designation annually. The tabulation for fiscal year 2023 resulted in 224 distressed counties and parishes, 28 non-distressed counties and parishes, and 240 isolated areas within non-distressed counties and parishes (see list below).

2023 DISTRESSED COUNTIES & PARISHES

DRA's region encompasses 252 counties and parishes across eight states. Enabling legislation dictates that at least 75% of DRA's funds must be invested in economically distressed counties and parishes and isolated areas within non-distressed counties and parishes.

CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

Community Infrastructure Fund (CIF) investments strengthen the economic viability of our Delta communities. In FY 2023, DRA invested over \$34 million in 35 projects to address flood control, basic public infrastructure, and local transportation infrastructure improvements that enhance local and regional economies throughout the DRA region. These investments are expected to create or retain 6,900 jobs and affect over 11,700 families.

STATES' ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The States' Economic Development Assistance Program (SEDAP) is DRA's primary investment tool. In FY 2023, DRA invested over \$18 million in 45 projects that will improve water and sewer systems, boost business development, enhance infrastructure, and support job training in communities throughout the Delta region. These investments were matched by \$53.3 million and will attract an additional \$62 million in private investments. These investments are expected to create or retain nearly 1,100 jobs, train over 1,700 individuals, and affect more than 5,800 families.

PUBLIC WORKS AND ECONOMIC ADJUSTMENT ASSISTANCE

The Economic Development Administration, an agency in the U.S. Department of Commerce, made \$3 million of its FY 2023 Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance (PWEAA) program available to DRA. This program supports rural communities by investing in projects that leverage existing regional assets and the implementation of community development strategies that advance economic prosperity in distressed regions.

In 2023, two projects were approved by EDA for funding:

- Wallace Community College Regional Maintenance Training Equipment in Alabama at \$694,870
- Winrock Innovation Fundamental I-Fund in Arkansas at \$521,004

DRA is essential to economic development in the 252 counties and parishes within our eight-state region. As noted by the Southern Economic Advancement Project, "[t]he economic conditions within the Delta and the Black Belt regions continue to negatively impact the lives of the people there and the nation's overall economic health." The investments made via DRA for basic public infrastructure, transportation infrastructure, business development, and workforce development are vital to the economic development of those areas.

HUMAN INFRASTRUCTURE

DELTA WORKFORCE GRANT PROGRAM

The Delta Workforce Grant Program (DWP) targets federal resources toward communities in the DRA region that have been hit hard by industrial downsizing, business closures, and job losses as a result of the public health and economic crisis. DWP supports projects and initiatives that create a more vibrant economic future for the region by expanding job training and re-employment opportunities; aligning workforce and economic development strategies; creating sustainable talent pipelines; establishing or enhancing locally or regionally significant public-private partnerships; and supporting enhanced workforce productivity through investments in innovative programming.

DRA announced 28 DWP projects in all eight states, totaling \$11.7 million. As a result of this investment, nearly 3,800 individuals are projected to receive industry-driven skills training for high-demand jobs in their communities. See the snapshot below:



Marion Military Institute (MMI) was awarded \$400,000 for the Marion Military Institute First Responder Program. The program will expand its training capability, allowing MMI Fire Cadets to acquire the national Emergency Vehicle Operator certification and earn the Fire Apparatus: Pumper certification on

site.

ALABAMA

Alabama Department of Commerce was awarded over \$434,000 for the Macon County Workforce Development Initiative. The program will provide work readiness and employment training for residents in Macon County for careers in advanced manufacturing; agriculture and construction; health care; information technology; and transportation, distribution, and logistics.

West Central Alabama Area Health Education

Center, in coordination with partners across Hale,

Marengo, and Perry Counties, was awarded \$450,000 for the Longleaf Outreach Project. This innovative, community-based workforce development project aims to increase the health care workforce pipeline in rural Alabama.

Town of Fort Deposit, in collaboration with the cities and towns of Yellow Bluff, York Linden, and Clayton, was awarded \$450,000 to implement a comprehensive plan to increase the number of certified water and wastewater workers across the five communities.


Southern Alabama Area Health Education Center was

awarded \$450,000 for the Southern Alabama Rural Training Program. The program aims to improve health care delivery in rural areas and address the need for trained health professionals in rural communities.

ARKANSAS

Southeast Arkansas Community Action Corporation (SEACAC) was awarded over \$229,000 for the SEACAC Certified Caregiver and Nursing Assistant Workforce Development Program. The program will provide access to certification and continuing education for health care workers throughout the South Arkansas Delta and prepare individuals to care for patients in diverse settings.

East Arkansas Community College, in collaboration with Southeast Arkansas College,

was awarded over \$449,000 for the Arkansas Delta Trucking Academy to increase training capacity for commercial drivers.

Women's Foundation of Arkansas was

awarded \$375,000 for the Tjuana Byrd Internship Program. The program will provide Arkansas young women of color, ages 18-22, opportunities to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and math industries with leading Arkansas companies.



ILLINOIS

Mentoring Mission, in partnership with the Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University's Gaetz Aerospace Institute and John A. Logan College, was awarded nearly \$449,500 to establish an aviation maintenance pipeline through the Aviation Maintenance Technical Pipeline Focused Initiative.

KENTUCKY

Madisonville Community College was awarded over \$436,000 to expand the capacity for its

electrical technology and heating, ventilation, and air conditioning degree programs.

Green River Area Development District was

awarded \$450,000 for its H2O project. The project will enable water and wastewater operator apprentices in the Green River region of Western Kentucky to participate in the Kentucky Rural Water Association's Registered Apprenticeship Program.

LOUISIANA

Baton Rouge North Economic Development

District, in partnership with Southern University, ExxonMobil, and Linde plc, was awarded \$450,000 for the HBCU Decarbonization Workforce Development Program. The program aims to build a strategic black, indigenous, and people of color workforce that is focused on decarbonizing energy and industrial processes.

NOVAC was awarded \$450,000 for its Growing Film Production in Southeast Louisiana project. The project will provide training and support for job placement within the film industry through a publicprivate partnership with the government, employers, and labor unions in film production.

Reconcile New Orleans, Inc., was awarded over \$405,000 to provide work readiness training, career technical education, and other vocational training, internships, and on-the-job training in the hospitality industry to Opportunity Youth in Orleans Parish.

New Orleans Business Alliance, in collaboration with the City of New Orleans' Office of Workforce Development, YouthForce NOLA, Thrive New Orleans, Urban League of Louisiana, Delgado Community College, and the University of New Orleans, was awarded \$450,000 to expand opportunities for entry-level positions within clean infrastructure.

South Louisiana Community College was awarded nearly \$420,000 to expand its welding, maritime structural fitter, and machine tool program cohort to five campuses throughout the Acadiana region.

DELTA WORKFORCE GRANT PROGRAM

MISSISSIPPI

Mississippi Community College Board

was awarded \$450,000 for its Enhanced Delta Aviation Project. The project will build upon and supplement the Delta Aviation Project efforts, in which participants train to become aviation maintenance technicians, address the potential need for COVIDrelated distance learning, and support underserved participants in its service area.

Mississippi Delta Community College

(MDCC) was awarded over \$346,000 for its Navigating the Economy and Workforce through Creativity, Revitalization, Education, and Science of Technology (NEW CREST) project. NEW CREST will implement a computer network technology program, targeting underserved new, incumbent, and dislocated workers in MDCC's service area, and offer training in telecommunications, network technologies, administration, hardware maintenance, operating systems, network planning, and implementation.

Rust College was awarded nearly \$255,000 for the Rust College Rural AgriTech Program. The program will produce viable economic development strategies for small, rural communities; create a sustainable talent pipeline; and establish locally and regionally significant public-private partnerships between underrepresented

students, farmers, and aeronautical professionals.

Jackson State University was awarded nearly \$450,000 to develop an online cybersecurity and information systems management certificate program. The program will train new entrants to the workforce, incumbent workers, and distance learners for cybersecurity and information technology careers.

City of Natchez was awarded over \$443,000 for the Natchez-Adams County Workforce Initiative. The initiative will develop and implement a workforce training system to align workforce development initiatives with current and future employment trends. Dislocated workers, new entrants to the workforce, and incumbent workers residing in Natchez-Adams County and surrounding areas will be upskilled or will be trained and placed in quality, in-demand jobs.

Mississippi Coding Academies was

awarded \$450,000 to provide career training as computer coders and developers in the tech field.



MISSOURI

Three Rivers College was awarded over \$402,000 for the Workforce Ready Project. The project will enable four Southeast Missouri regional learning institutions to establish training programs for new entry and incumbent workers in health care, transportation, construction, manufacturing, or technology-related fields.

Missouri State University-West Plains was

awarded over \$437,000 to engage unemployed or underemployed adults, veterans, high school youth, incumbent workers, and other underrepresented groups through education and career training within the manufacturing and construction sections.

TENNESSEE

Agricenter International was awarded nearly \$450,000 to expand AgTech career pathways for new entrants and for dislocated and incumbent workers through its GradTech program. The program will expand to year-round service delivery to meet the needs and availability of incumbent and dislocated workers by providing a skills- and workbased learning experience.

ProGeny Startups, in collaboration with the GradUS Project, was awarded nearly \$443,000 to implement Project E.A.T. – Food as an Economic Mobility Tool 2.0. The project will serve dislocated and unemployed workers, with an emphasis on serving domestic violence victims in Shelby, Gibson, and Madison counties, who will be enrolled in a job training program supporting food-based manufacturing.

Memphis Chamber Foundation was awarded over \$447,000 as part of a collaborative effort to build a sustainable talent pipeline of STEM-focused, jobready individuals to fill the increasing demand for advanced manufacturing jobs in the Memphis region, retain existing advanced manufacturer clusters, and competitively attract additional advanced manufacturers to the region.

WORKFORCE OPPORTUNITY FOR RURAL COMMUNITIES

In partnership with the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration, Appalachian Regional Commission, and Northern Border Regional Commission, approximately \$44 million in grants were awarded in fiscal year 2023 under the Workforce Opportunity for Rural Communities (WORC) initiative to support workforce training and education in rural communities across the Delta, Appalachian, and Northern Border regions.

The fifth round of WORC grants was announced on September 14, 2023. See the snapshot below.

DELTA DOCTORS

In partnership with the U.S. Department of State, DRA's Delta Doctors program helps address the health disparities and high levels of health professional shortages by granting J-1 visa waivers for physicians who are willing to provide medical services in DRA communities. The program allows foreign physicians who are trained in the United States to work in medically underserved areas for three years, although most doctors in the program continue to serve their communities beyond their three-year commitment. Physicians participating in the Delta Doctors program do not take jobs away from native physicians, but instead provide services in areas where there would otherwise be a shortage of physicians, increasing access to affordable, quality health care.

In FY 2023, DRA received 62 J-1 Visa Waiver applications. A breakdown by state is below.

DELTA REGION COMMUNITY HEALTH SYSTEMS PROGRAM

DRA, in collaboration with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration, provides the Delta Region Community Health Systems Development – Technical Assistance Program (DRCHSD) to enhance health care delivery in the Delta region. Through intensive technical assistance, health care providers in select rural communities receive help to identify and address health care needs while strengthening the local healthcare system.

The following 11 health care facilities were selected for the DRCHSD Cohort 2022 (to begin the program in 2023):

DELTA REGION RURAL HEALTH WORKFORCE TRAINING PROGRAM

Through a partnership with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration, the Delta Region Rural Health Workforce Training Program addresses the ongoing need in health care facilities for trained administrative support or business operations professionals in rural communities through the development of strategic networks that support recruitment, formal training, certification and student placement. This program aims to provide training and pathways to professional certifications to current administrative support professionals working in rural DRA region healthcare facilities, as well as new entrants to the workforce and dislocated workers.

was awarded \$600,000 to create a sustainable pipeline of trained rural health professionals and assist in retaining current health care staff in nine rural parishes with opportunities for training and education in critical positions. The strategic network of partners for this project includes Bossier Parish Community College, BetaFlix, Inc., North Louisiana Medical Center/Allegiance Health Management, and Jackson Parish Hospital.

In August 2022, three additional applicants were selected for program participation: **Alabama Southern Area Health Education Center, Arkansas Rural Health Partnership,** and **Jackson State Community College.**

INNOVATIVE READINESS TRAINING

DRA partners with the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD) and the U.S. military's reserve forces to host Innovative Readiness Training (IRT) medical missions, bringing medical, dental, and optical care to Delta residents in need of quality health care at no cost to the patients. IRT is a DOD military training opportunity that delivers joint training opportunities to increase deployment readiness while simultaneously providing key health care services with lasting benefits for Delta communities. By utilizing their extensive resources, the military is able to meet some of the region's most urgent health care needs. Among the services provided during IRT missions are basic medical and wellness exams; vision exams and single lens, glasses; and dental exams and extractions.

In 2023, DRA hosted the Northwest Arkansas Wellness Mission. The clinic site was conducted at Yellville High School in Yellville, Ark. Lodging and command operations were conducted at Mountain Home Junior High School in Mountain Home, Ark. Additional training was conducted at the Mountain Home Emergency Training Center and Baxter Hospital in Baxter, Ark.

Medical Care: The team saw 1,520 patients, consisting of 13,268 procedures and 490 eyeglasses fabricated and distributed, producing a fair market value of services totaling \$713,724.

Training: The total number of training days was 16, with 10 days of clinical care. A total of 22,263 hours of training was conducted, consisting of 11,276 hours of clinical proficiency.

Dental: The dental clinic provided 2,082 procedures, resulting in a total of \$405,346 saved for the community.

Veterinary: The veterinary clinic saw over 200 patients and performed 834 procedures, saving the local community pet owners \$35,070 in medical expenses.

CAPACITY BUILDING

In 2023, two capacity-building programs were created to address capacity needs among Local Development Districts and strategic planning needs across the DRA footprint.

LOCAL DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (LDD) COMMUNITY SUPPORT PILOT PROGRAM

The LDD Community Support Pilot Program is a noncompetitive grant program open to the 45 LDDs in DRA's service area. This program targets capacity-building and community support resources to local development districts that are helping economically distressed, isolated areas of distress, and persistent poverty communities navigate federal, state, and other resources that impact economic and community development. The program is designed to enhance the region's resiliency and ability to compete for and leverage resources. The program is funded through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law signed by President Biden.

The LDD Community Support Pilot Program awarded almost \$2.3 million in FY 2023 to 34 of the 45 LDDs in DRA's footprint. LDDs are using funds from this program to support existing staff, hire new staff, and increase overall engagement and the grant writing and other technical assistance support provided to economically distressed communities.

STRATEGIC PLANNING PROGRAM

Communities across DRA's eight-state region lack the capacity and resources to strategically plan. This program gives public entities access to strategic planning funds to address long-standing issues and develop a roadmap for economic growth and opportunity. Applicants for this program have the autonomy to apply for a plan that fits the unique needs and challenges in their community. Eligible plans include, but are not limited to, economic development plans, utility rate studies, transportation plans, workforce development plans, and broadband deployment plans. The program is funded through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law signed by President Biden.

The Strategic Planning Program awarded almost \$2.3 million in FY 23 to 18 recipients across seven of the eight DRA states. Funded plans in FY 2023 included comprehensive economic development plans, feasibility studies, master plans, preliminary engineering reports, and workforce development plans.



ALABAMA

The **Craig Field Airport and Industrial Authority** has been awarded \$150,000 for a strategic plan to renovate Hangar 205 and utilize it as a source of business attraction and job creation.

ILLINOIS

The **Alexander-Cairo Port District** has been awarded \$150,000 for the development of a master plan that will identify the scope for port development and the future of the riverport.

The **City of Sesser** has been awarded over \$45,000 for a video-assisted sewer inspection and planning report that will position Sesser to identify sewer lines in need of repair or replacement and leverage funding sources that will lead to improved critical infrastructure.

The **City of Carbondale** has been awarded \$150,000 for a master plan to address climate resiliency and flooding that has negatively impacted public services and underserved communities in the city.

The **City of Mounds** has been awarded \$150,000 for a preliminary engineering report to address infrastructure issues, such as flooding, that have negatively impacted economic activity and business growth in the city.

KENTUCKY

The **Webster County Fiscal Court** has been awarded \$150,000 for a comprehensive economic development plan that will focus on creating an economically- and climate-resilient community that has experienced a decline in coal-industry jobs.

LOUISIANA

The **City of Minden** has been awarded \$135,000 for a comprehensive economic development plan that will assess basic public infrastructure and strategies that will enhance workforce and small business development.

The **Lake Providence Port Commission** has been awarded \$150,000 for a master plan that will focus on financial resourcing for infrastructure upgrades at logical hubs such as ports and railways.

The **City of Abbeville** has been awarded \$150,000 for a strategic plan that will allow the city to develop effective strategies to address job creation, entrepreneurship, and equity.

The Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana has been

awarded \$145,000 for a comprehensive economic development plan focusing on economic resiliency and developing a market-driven economic development strategy to provide a 10-year vision for the Coushatta Tribe.

The **Delta Agriculture Research and Sustainability District** has been awarded \$150,000 for a strategic plan that will focus on creating micro-business hubs that will be supported by a developing transportation network in the region.

The North Louisiana Growth and Development Foundation has been awarded \$150,000 for a workforce development plan that will focus on building a talent pipeline in Northeast Louisiana for career opportunities in the microelectronics industry.



MISSISSIPPI

The **City of Crystal Springs** has been awarded \$46,000 for a comprehensive economic development plan that will serve as a long-range policy guide to assist the city with future economic development decisions.

The **Jackson Redevelopment Authority** has been awarded \$150,000 for a master plan focusing on the redevelopment of Union Station and its potential as a catalyst for job creation, small business development, tourism, and improved infrastructure.

The **Leflore County Board of Supervisors** has been awarded \$150,000 for a strategic plan that will address challenges faced by health care systems in the Mississippi Delta, including the closures of hospitals and clinical education sites.

MISSOURI

The South Central Ozark Council of Governments,

in collaboration with Howell, Oregon, Ozark, Douglas, Texas, Wright, and Shannon counties, has been awarded \$150,000 for the development of a feasibility study that will focus on the development of a regional industrial incubator that will offer financing, mentoring, administrative support, and physical space to businesses.

The **City of Poplar Bluff** has been awarded more than \$72,500 for a comprehensive economic development plan that will allow the city to address infrastructure issues such as an aging waterwastewater system.

The **City of Rolla** has been awarded \$50,000 for a comprehensive economic development plan to develop a roadmap of economic growth and address issues such as infrastructure and transportation.

DELTA REVITALIZATION THROUGH INNOVATION, VISION & EQUITY (DRIVE)


The Delta Revitalization through Innovation, Vision, and Equity (DRIVE) pilot program, in partnership with the University of Memphis' Division of Research and Innovation, was created to help distressed and underserved communities build capacity and drive community-centered economic growth in the Mississippi River Delta region. As identified in DRA's Regional Development Plan IV, the DRIVE pilot program is a fundamental component of DRA's efforts to enhance sustainable and inclusive local placemaking and community capacity across its eight-state region.

Through an intensive year-long, cohortbased program, the DRIVE pilot program brings together eight small towns to increase local capacity in economic and workforce development that will support long-term economic opportunity in rural communities. The participating towns include: Eudora, Arkansas: Helena-West Helena, Arkansas: Osceola, Arkansas; Hazlehurst, Mississippi; Port Gibson, Mississippi; Tunica, Mississippi; Brownsville, Tennessee; and Whiteville, Tennessee.

WHITE HOUSE INITIATIVES

JUSTICE40

President Biden's Justice40 initiative aims to deliver 40% of the overall benefits of climate, clean energy, affordable and sustainable housing, clean water, and other investments to disadvantaged communities that are marginalized, overburdened, and underserved. The Justice40 initiative is a directive created through Executive Order 14008 and supports the Biden-Harris Administration's comprehensive approach to advancing equity for all as designated through Executive Order 13985.

DRA is participating in Justice40 through its grantmaking activities, including Bipartisan Infrastructure Law-funded initiatives.

BUILD AMERICA, BUY AMERICA

The Build America, Buy America Act was signed into law in 2021 by President Biden as part of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs ct. The act requires that federal agencies ensure that funds for a federal financial assistance program for infrastructure are obligated only to projects that use iron, steel, manufactured products, and construction materials that are produced in the United States. Federal agencies are required to include a Buy America preference in the terms and conditions of each award for applicable infrastructure projects.

DRA's stated commitment is to implement prioritization criteria in its grant programs to support initiatives with a direct connection between economic development and healthy food access.




EXECUTIVE ORDER ON RACIAL EQUITY
